VALE – TOMMY MOYES 12 September 1938 – 8 June 2010

It is with regret we report the passing of Thomas Robertson Moyes. Tom was born in Edinburgh. He was one of many "UK Enlistees" who were enlisted into the Australian Army in London because of the shortage of qualified deck officers in 32 Small Ship Squadron in the early 1960s. Tommy enlisted in 1965 and after a short period in the Squadron was posted to HQ Australian Force Vietnam the following year. He was there again with 11 Movement Control Group in 1967/68.

He was posted to Singapore with 11 Movement Control Group as part of the Far East Land Forces from December 1968 to February 1971.

After all this he finally managed to skipper a ship (which was what he originally signed up to do) and took *AS1351 John Monash* to Malaysia, Singapore, Vietnam, Indonesia and the Philippines during 1971/72. He resigned from the Army as a Major in July 1973 and joined the Royal Australian Navy.

During his time with the senior service he commanded the Boom Defence Vessel, HMAS Kimbla which was later converted to an Oceanographic Research Vessel. He took this ship around Australia and worked mainly around Darwin. He resigned about five years later as a Lieutenant Commander.

From here he signed up with the Australian National Line as a Deck Officer and after about twelve months was elevated to Master in command of bulk ore carriers. He retired in 2003. Tommy's funeral service was held at Macquarie Park Cemetery, Sydney on 11 June 2010.

Over 100 people attended and eulogies were given by his family, friends, and former RAN sailors who served with him on HMAS Kimbla. Ian Henderson and Ross McMurray also attended.

VALE – FRED HARTNACK 21 June 1938 – 20 April 2010

Justus Frederick Hartnack was born at Port Elizabeth, South Africa on 21 June 1938. Some of his education was with the South African Nautical College in Cape Town.

In 1964/65 he was among two engineers and 16 deck officers who were enlisted in the UK to man our Army ships. This was because there was a shortage of officers serving on the Australian coast and the government at that time did not allow the Army to recruit in Australia.

Fred was the skipper of various LSMs that sailed to Papua New Guinea in 1966/67. They were the 'normal' trips conducting resupply of plant, vehicles and equipment to RAE construction units building roads and bridges. They were also called upon to do recruiting voyages for the Pacific Island Regiment around the coast. They were actually called 'Prestige Patrols' but no one knew why. They was nothing prestigious about them.

Fred also did two tours to Vietnam – firstly as skipper of *AV1353 Harry Chauvel* in 1967/68 and on *AS3051 John Monash* in 1969. Fred tells an interesting story about an incident with the *Harry Chauvel* in Vietnam in the "Boots 'N' All" article in this issue.

After Fred left the Army in 1969 he became Assistant Harbour Master for the Port Of Launceston Authority where he piloted ships for approximately ten years. He then joined the Australian Maritime College as Master of the training ship *Wyuna* as well as being a senior lecturer at the college.

From 1982 to 1984 he served as First Officer with Atlas Offshore Oil Platform providing supply and saturation diving support on the North Australian coast and Bass Straight.

From 1985 to 2002 he was Master with North Western Shipping and Towage providing tug operations in Tasmanian Ports. This was the longest and least favourite position he held until he retired.

Fred's other love, apart from his family, was a Triumph America "Wedgetail" motorcycle which was the first of its type to be registered in Tasmania. Unfortunately Fred couldn't ride as much as he would have liked as he became quite ill after he fitted it out. However, he spent many an enjoyable hour working on it in his shed. He was a member of the Wedgetail Outriders Association and the Vietnam Veterans Motorcycle Club.




Fred died after a very long battle with cancer on 20 April 2010. James McDermott and his wife, Kate, attended his funeral in Launceston on 23 April 2010. James reports that the funeral was well attended as Fred had developed quite a circle of friends in Northern Tasmania.

The Vietnam Motorcycle Club provided a guard of honour and the coffin bearers. They also provided a few anecdotes. Fred's motorcycle name was "Fearless"; however on one of his rides his cycle stopped and could not be started. After that incident he was known as "Fuel-less Fearless".

James said that while it was a wet and miserable day, those gathered managed to celebrate Fred's life rather than mourn his departure, for most people realized it was a release.

Reg Hamann, who was with Fred on five LSM voyages, said in a note to Fred's wife, Lois, that "Fred was the best Skipper he served under, was a gentleman and a bloody good mate". I think we would all agree with that.

Our thoughts and condolences are with Fred's wife, Lois and son, Jamie and family.

VALE - ALF SMITH 22 September 1929 – 16 June 2010

Alfred William Smith died on 16 June 2010 after a long period in hospital at Woy Woy NSW. He was 81 years old and had been ill for some time.

Alf was born in Melbourne and at the age of 14 went to sea with the Merchant Navy. He was in London celebrating VE Day marking the end of WWII. He remained a seaman until 1951 when he joined the Canadian Army and served with it in Germany until 1954.

In 1966 he enlisted in the Australian Army and after recruit and Corps training was posted to the Transportation Centre, Chowder Bay to regain his sea legs. After that he served most of his time with 32 Small Ship Squadron in various places including: Papua New Guinea, Singapore, Indonesia and nearly two years in Vietnam aboard *AS3051 John Monash*, *AV1354 Brudenell White* and *AV1356 Clive Steele*. He also served in 1 Terminal Group, 10 Terminal Group and 40 Water Transport Squadron (Heavy).

BOOTS 'N' ALL

This story was published in the November 2009 edition of "The Phuoc Tuy News", the newsletter of the RAE Vietnam Veterans' Association, and Secretary Vin Neale kindly authorised us to reproduce it. Captain Fred Hartnack, Warrant Officer Ian Johnston and Sapper Dave Gray provided the details.

According to the ship's log, on the morning of 29th December 1967 a platoon of infantry along with elements from 1 Field Squadron and 104 Signal Squadron boarded *AV1353 Harry Chauvel* anchored off Vung Tau, South Vietnam. *Harry Chauvel* was a Landing Ship Medium (LSM) of 203.5 ft. overall length, basically designed to transport five medium sized tanks. She was a unit of 32 Small Ship Squadron RAE, stationed in Vietnam on logistic support duties for the Australian and United States forces. A total of 46 x Other Ranks and 6 x Officers made up the crew. Five Mk 4 assault boats along with their 40 hp Johnston outboard motors had been loaded the previous day from 1 Australian Logistic Support Group (1 ALSG). These boats were to be crewed by sappers from *Harry Chauvel*. Instructions from 1ALSG to Captain Fred Hartnack, Commanding Officer of *Harry Chauvel* were to determine and investigate the possibilities of beaching an LSM for the purpose of operational logistic support. However, no information was available to Captain Hartnack as to what the infantry task was but it is presumed by the fact that it was only a platoon strength mission its purpose would be reconnaissance.

Harry Chauvel travelled 43 nautical miles up the coast from Vung Tau, placing the area of the recce right on the south east corner of Phuoc Tuy province where the border line meets the coast. Prior to the task nobody from Harry Chauvel was aware of any training having been carried out for an amphibious landing other than the normal beaching for the loading and discharging of vehicles and cargo. Certainly the sappers had never had experience or training in this sort of activity. And, although familiar with the operation of small craft this was limited. The only experience of the assault boats was that which they had received along with all sappers who had gone through Corps training doing watermanship at Camp Sapper on the Georges River near the School of Military Engineering.

The tactical command of the task was under the command of an infantry colonel aided by a major, with the ship under the command of Captain Hartnack, RAE. The Executive Officer was Captain Bill Tindale and the Troop Sergeant Major (TSM) was Warrant Officer Ian Johnston. Departure from Vung Tau was at 0800 hrs and the vessel steamed up the coast to the drop off position – a trip of approximately 2 hours.

On making the approach to shore a sandbar was encountered, approximately 400 yards out. Captain Hartnack considered this too dangerous to negotiate, with primary consideration for the safety of the ship and personnel on board. The ship was then anchored in deeper water to seaward of the sandbar. The colonel in charge ordered the operation to continue. The bow doors were opened, the ramp lowered and the five assault boats loaded with all the gear were launched into the water.

Life jackets were provided but were not worn by the troops other than the ship's personnel controlling the assault boats. The wearing of life jackets by the troops would have been an



encumbrance during the actual landing. The jackets however, were placed on the floor of the boats. The launching process was being overseen by Captain Hartnack, his Executive Officer and the TSM. It was observed that the troops were boarding with full combat kit with weapons, bandoliers, grenades, etc. as well as bum packs and wearing GP boots. One of the lieutenants was taken aside and had it pointed out to him the danger of wearing all this gear in such a hazardous situation. To his credit the young officer took note of what was said and went up to the ship's bridge to consult with the colonel. Fortunately permission was given for them to strip everything off except for their actual clothes. However, some of the troops kept the M60 belts and bandoliers on.

The five boats then headed off towards the shore in line abreast and approximately 100 ft. from the ship they encountered the highest part of the sandbar, and that's where disaster hit.

Sandbars are well known to mariners as being very tricky and dangerous obstacles with a seemingly life of their own. They cause many a mishap for vessels of all sorts. When a swell approaches a sandbar from the seaward side it sucks back the water from the sandbar causing a trough. The swell then hits the bar as a wave. It is this wave that causes all the trouble for boats as it comes upon the stern and forces the boat into a sidewise movement and quite often causes the boat to capsize. This is exactly what happened to all five boats at the same time, sending them all into a barrel role.

Everybody was thrown out of all five boats. All equipment weapons, radios, webbing, boots and outboard motors – the lot went straight to the bottom which at this stage was between 6 and 8 feet deep. As well as the equipment those troops wearing the bandoliers and belts also went to the bottom. Realizing that the men in the water had little or no chance of getting to shore not to mention the plight of the men who had sunk to the seabed, Fred and Ian launched two inflatable rafts from the ship's uppers and within a couple of minutes reached the scene of the disaster. The life rafts are circular rubber rafts with a tent like structure on top with two hatches on opposite sides. These rafts are almost impossible to control and are powered simply by paddles. It was a fine day with a fairly stiff breeze and it was this breeze that did all the powering.

In the meantime some troops had managed to cling onto the sides of the upturned boats, some had grabbed hold of the few life jackets that had made their way to the surface, some started to swim to shore and some started to drown. Ian, in his raft, managed to drag five onboard whilst about ten clung to the lifeline around the raft. His raft was then caught up in a rip and they were carried away South about 300 yards and then dumped onto the shore – all safe. Meanwhile Fred drifted over the troops who were on the bottom desperately struggling to free themselves from their weighty gear. This they all managed to do and made their way to the surface. Then, loaded up like Ian's, Fred's raft was blown straight to the shore. Miraculously the only injury suffered during all this was one broken leg.

While all this was happening, *Harry Chauvel*, under the command of the Executive Officer Bill Tindale, was on full alert with all armaments on standby. Orders were given not to fire any weapons for the risk of injuring or killing any of our own troops. The only weapon to reach shore was one Browning 9mm pistol and one SLR which a dedicated digger had somehow managed to get to shore. There they stood, some 50 personnel wet as shags on a rock with nothing but the greens they stood in – not even boots. This was enemy territory and without doubt the enemy were not far away. Apparently there were attempts to get a line ashore by the



ship's cook but to no avail. He was hauled aboard before the possibility of a further disaster. It would seem the Colonel sent some pretty frantic radio messages because about 90 minutes later a Chinook and five Iroquois 'Hueys' arrived on the scene. One 'Huey' picked up Fred and Ian and winched them back onboard *Harry Chauvel*. All troops, assault boats, life rafts and equipment were lifted off and flown directly to Vung Tau.

At 1805 hours, according to the ship's log, *Harry Chauvel* weighed anchor and proceeded to Vung Tau, arriving at 2145 hours. The remainder of the infantry and other units disembarked and the ship's crew reunited. We don't know what happened after that but would loved to have been a mozzie on the wall back at Headquarters 1 Australian Task Force – now wouldn't that have been interesting.

Thankfully nobody lost their life, no doubt in good measure to the quick thinking, bravery and skill of Captain Fred Hartnack and TSM Warrant Officer Ian Johnston – oh, also thanks to a good stiff breeze and an awful lot of luck".

What an interesting story, and a fitting tribute to Fred Hartnack and his crew of AV1353 Harry Chauvel.

A MEMORIAL TO NATIONAL SERVICEMEN

A National Service Memorial at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra will be dedicated on Wednesday 8 September 2010. The National Council of the National Servicemen's Association of Australia Incorporated and the Council of the Australian War Memorial have approved a fountain set in its own precinct on the Eastern side of the main entrance to the Australian War Memorial. Work began on this project just after ANZAC Day 2009.

The Memorial honours the 212 National Servicemen who died on active service – two in Borneo (both Sappers) and 210 in Vietnam – and commemorates the 287,000 young men called up in two schemes between 1951 and 1972 for service in the Royal Australian Navy, the Australian Army and the Royal Australian Air Force.

The Memorial will bear the inscription: "Dedicated to all Australian National Servicemen and in Memory to Those who Died."

The funds raised for this Memorial include a donation of \$150,000 from the Federal Government; \$150,000 from businessman Mr Kerry Stokes, AO; donations from State Governments, and local authorities around Australia and contributions from National Service and RSL sub-branches and individuals.

The National Servicemen's Association of Australia undertook the Memorial on behalf of all Australian National Servicemen. All Nashos are invited to the Dedication Parade and Service.

Dress for the event is requested to be coat, tie and medals.

Assembly will commence in ANZAC Parade from 0900 hrs. Step off will be at 1000 hrs. Nashos will march as one group, in companies of year of call up, without regard of Service or Corps.

The Dedication Ceremony will take place in the Eastern Precinct adjacent to the AWM building commencing at 1130 hrs in the presence of Her Excellency Ms Quentin Bryce, AC Governor General of the Commonwealth of Australia.
